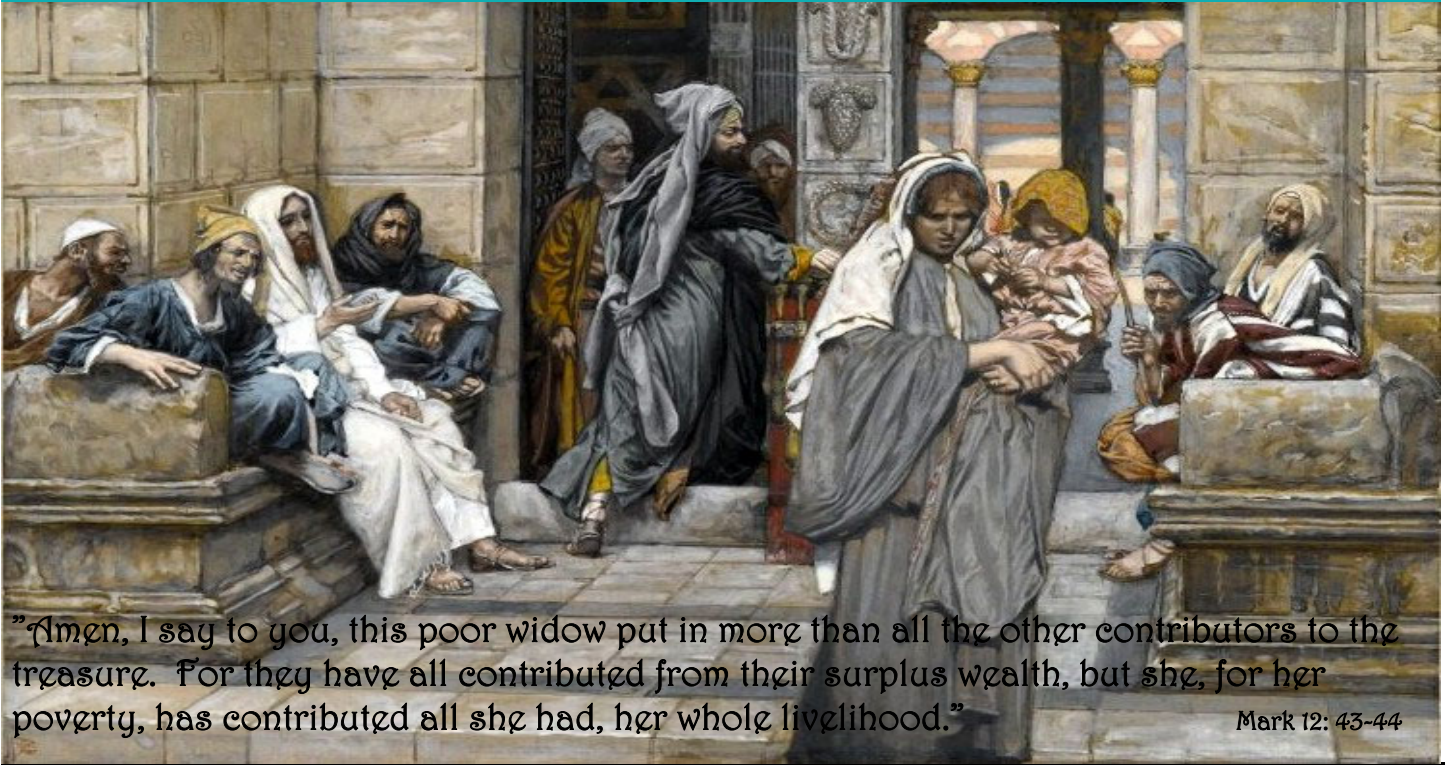

First, I must start by giving a big **Thank You** to all who attended this year's Fall Gala. While our attendance was down this year, we still raised a good amount of money for St. Peter's. For 2019 we are going to try a Friday night event – I hope that will encourage more people to attend. Attendance needs to be between 250 & 300 to make the return on the event planning, setup, etc.

Over the past couple of weeks, I've been processing and doing the data entry on our weekly Sunday Collection envelopes. In that process, I've put together a few suggestions that will, hopefully, save you some time along with our counters, or our future Development Specialist, in processing your weekly gifts.

- If you are unable to attend Mass for any reason and need to submit gifts for multiple weeks, you only need to prepare **one check** and use one envelope. The gifts and checks are all processed for the date on Sunday they are received.
- Be sure to mark the amount of your weekly gift on the outside of your envelope. Our counters try to catch these unmarked envelopes and record the amount included inside the envelope, but some slip through. If it's a cash gift, we can't give you proper credit.
- I've had many questions about our direct debit and giving to multiple areas like the Feed the Needy program, Flower Fund, and the Msgr. Dunn Foundation. If you regularly give to the same funds every month, we can customize a weekly or monthly gift to your personal preference.

There will be some minor changes to the envelopes in 2019 to help us further accurately record your weekly gifts.

As we approach the end of the year, it is a great time to review your financial situation with your tax or investment professional. The end of the year could be a good time to make a charitable donation of stock or securities to St. Peter's. You can receive a deduction for the fair market value of the stock on the date of the contribution and avoid capital gain taxes on the appreciation of the stock or securities.

If you are over 70 ½, and still need to meet your annual minimum distribution, on your IRA, you can elect to directly make a qualified charitable distribution directly to St. Peter's. The IRS allows up to \$100,000 annually.

Finally, with the changes in the new tax law and the new standard deductions, you may find yourself in a different situation than in previous years. What may have qualified as an itemized deduction in past years will not this year.

There are many options on how you may make a gift to St. Peter's or the Msgr. Dunn Foundation. If you ever have any questions, please do not hesitate to give me a call in the Development Office.

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

Our final column of the pastorate of Father Ferdinand Schreiber follows. Next week we will look at the brief pastorate of his successor, Father Nicholas Hassel.

Upon the completion of the construction of our present St. Peter's Church, Father Schreiber continued his ministry in Mansfield for five more years. The needs of our parish had grown so much that Father Schreiber was given the assistance of a number of assistants. They included Fathers Joseph Waechter (1909-1910), John William Schmits (1910-1911), James J. Gough (1911-1913), Karl A. Brand (1913 – 1920), and F. A. Boehnlein (1920-1922). Father W. S. Danielak was assigned here in 1922 and provided parish leadership after Father Schreiber was transferred to his next assignment and until Father Hassel arrived to take charge.

Father Schreiber was noted for the pastoral concern he demonstrated for his parishioners and for others in the Mansfield community. An example of his concern is found in a homily he preached for the funeral of thirteen year old Ada Wettrick, who died of tuberculosis in 1912. He said, "She was as a beautiful flower in full bloom, and our Blessed Savior going into his flower garden plucks off the fairest and tenderest flower in the garden...God did not take her until after a long illness. You know the history of her sickness better than I do. She suffered, resigned to God's will, and God was certainly pleased with her."

Bishop Schrembs of Cleveland transferred Father Schreiber to the pastorate of St. Bernard's in Akron on April 5, 1922. At the time, parishioners and city leaders alike lamented the loss of Father Schreiber's presence in Mansfield. Newspaper articles and editorials were written praising Father Schreiber's service in Mansfield and noted that he was respected by Catholics and non-Catholics in equal measure.

After his appointment to St. Bernard's, Father Schreiber was made Dean of the Akron Deanery. Soon after that, on July 3, 1925 (his 64th birthday and the 39th anniversary of his priestly ordination), he was raised to the rank of a Domestic Prelate with the title of Monsignor. Monsignor Schreiber continued as Pastor of St. Bernard's through all the years of the Great Depression and through the Second World War.

On June 2, 1948 Pope Pius XII appointed Monsignor Schreiber a Protonotary Apostolic, the highest honor a priest can receive short of the episcopacy.

In 1949, Monsignor Schreiber took a fall on the ice. His injuries effectively ended his active ministry and he remained bedfast at St. Thomas Hospital in Akron from then on until his death on April 1, 1957. His solemn funeral was celebrated April 4, 1957 at St. Bernard's in Akron. He was buried at Holy Cross Cemetery in Akron. At the time of his death, Monsignor Schreiber was counted the oldest diocesan priest in the entire country at the venerable age of 95.

Monsignor Ferdinand Schreiber was and remains one of the most influential pastors of our Parish.

THE CALL TO DISCIPLESHIP

The core vocation in the Gospel of Mark is the vocation, or call, to discipleship. Today's Gospel passage provides us with one last example of what the vocation to discipleship means, and one example of what it doesn't mean. A destitute widow shows us that discipleship means following Jesus' way of service, even if it requires giving one's livelihood (or life). The scribes show us by their bad example that discipleship should entail a vocation to extend God's care to those who are most in need.

In our reading from the book of Kings another widow and her son are close to death. They too give what little they have, but they are rewarded by Elijah with food enough for a year. And the reading from the Letter to the Hebrews reminds us that Jesus sacrificed his life "to bring salvation to those who eagerly await him" (Hebrews 9:28).

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Veterans Day began with the signing of a symbolic treaty between the Allies and Germany ending World War I (then called the "Great War") on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. The auspicious date was actually a well-established religious holiday, the feast of Saint Martin of Tours, a beloved soldier saint of the army of Rome. After World War II, Armistice Day was changed to Veterans Day in the United States and Remembrance Day in Britain, but of course the feast of Saint Martin endures.

Martin was named after Mars, the god of war, and against the advice of his parents he went on his own to church. He became a catechumen at the age of ten. By fifteen he was enlisted in the cavalry in France. Coming across a poor man, Martin had an impulse to divide his bright red soldier's cape and clothe him. He later had the insight that he had served Christ, and the other half of his cape became a lifelong sign to him of his duty to serve the poor. Housed in a tiny church *capella* or "chapel," the cape became a great object of pilgrimage on the way to Compostella, and a favored place for the prayers of soldiers. Martin was not so eager to serve as bishop as he had been as a soldier, and legend says that he hid in a barn filled with geese to avoid episcopal election. To this day, the customary meal for November 11 is goose! Traditionally, this is the last feast day before winter closes in, and begins a period of fasting once known as "Saint Martin's Lent" or "Martinmas," that later developed into the season of Advent.
