**THE CHILDREN'S LITURGY OF THE WORD****November 3** Heather Kathy**Constantly Seek His Face**

At a recent weekly "Music & Fellowship" gathering at Richland Correctional, our final hymn was *Irish Blessing (Blessing Prayer)*. As we sang, we lifted in memory and love our Prison Ministry team members and brothers who are no longer with us due to having moved away or having been released. At the conclusion of the song, we took to heart these words in verse 6 - "Christ is on your left, Christ on your right" - and we turned to those on either side of us to tell them we do indeed see Christ in them.

I was reminded of that as I read the Entrance Antiphon of today's Mass: *Let the hearts that seek the Lord rejoice; turn to the Lord and his strength; constantly seek his face.*

Our daily lives and encounters provide countless opportunities to see Christ's face in everyone we meet - and to discern how others are seeing Christ in us. Perhaps the wisdom and inspirations of the following holy ones are worth our reflection this week:

"I see Jesus in every human being. I say to myself, this is hungry Jesus, I must feed him. This is sick Jesus, I must wash him and tend to him. I serve because I love Jesus." Mother Teresa (now St. Teresa of Calcutta)

"The Lord manifests Himself to those who stop for some time in peace and humility of heart. If you look in murky and turbulent waters, you cannot see the reflection of your face. If you want to see the face of Christ, stop and collect your thoughts in silence, and close the door of your soul to the noise of external things." St. Anthony of Padua

"Seeking the face of God in everything, everyone, all the time, and his hand in every happening; This is what it means to be contemplative in the heart of the world. Seeing and adoring the presence of Jesus, especially in the lowly appearance of bread, and in the distressing disguise of the poor." Mother Teresa

"[Our holy ones] live in God already on this earth, attracted and transformed by the dazzling brightness of his Face. God's true friends, the saints, recognized and loved the Face of God in others, especially the poorest and neediest, and lovingly contemplated this for hours in prayer. For us they are encouraging examples to imitate." Pope Benedict XVI

"To be able to love one another, we must pray much, for prayer gives a clean heart and a clean heart can see God in our neighbor. If now we have no peace, it is because we have forgotten how to see God in one another." Mother Teresa

"In the Mass we encounter many people, but do we really see them as brothers and sisters? Does the Eucharist lead us to reach out to the poor, to the sick, to the marginalized, seeing the face of Jesus in them?" Pope Francis

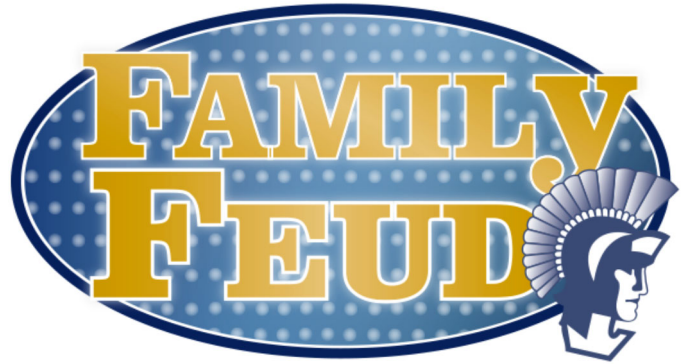

## 175<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY NOTES

With this installment of the 175<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Notes column, we begin taking a look at the pastorate of our twelfth Pastor, Father Anthony A. "Tony" Borgia.

Anthony Borgia was born in Norwalk, Ohio, to Rose (Skinn) Borgia and James V. Borgia (died in 1969) on March 16, 1957. He was one of seven children. He attended St. Paul School in Norwalk and graduated from St. Paul High School in 1975. After his father's death at an early age, Tony's mother was re-married; this time to a widower named Edwin Riedy. Edwin had four children of his own and the result was a quite large family. Edwin Riedy was instrumental in helping to shape Tony into a young man. Regrettably, Edwin, too, died young in 1976.

After graduation, Tony worked as a bartender and cook at Barone's Beer Barrel. He also worked for a time as cook and general helper at Sandusky St. Mary Parish for Father (later Bishop) Robert Donnelly. Tony later credited Bishop Donnelly with helping to inspire his pursuit of the priesthood.

In 1976, Tony entered St. Gregory College Seminary in Cincinnati. He received his Bachelor's Degree in Philosophy from there in 1980. He was then enrolled at Mount St. Mary of the West Seminary in Cincinnati to begin Theological studies there. In 1983, he was ordained to the Transitional Diaconate and was assigned to spend his Diaconal Year at St. Michael's in Findlay.

In 1984, Tony graduated from Mount St. Mary's with a Masters of Divinity. He was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop James R. Hoffman on June 9, 1984 at Our Lady, Queen of the Most Holy Rosary Cathedral in Toledo. His first assignment was a priest was as an Associate Pastor at St. Patrick Heatherdowns Parish in Toledo.

In 1986, Father Tony was appointed Director of Youth Ministry and Diocesan Spiritual Director of Youth. It was an appointment for which he was ideally suited by temperament, training and ability. Father Tony was a very effective Youth Minister. In 1988 Father Tony was appointed as Chaplain to the Sisters of St. Francis in Sylvania while continuing to serve in his appointments in the Office of Youth Ministry.

In 1993, Father Tony was named Pastor of St. Joseph Parish in Galion. During his years in Galion, one of Father Tony's many accomplishments was the construction and completion of the Parish Activity Center in Galion, situated across the street from St. Joseph Church.

In 2000, Father Tony was appointed Pastor of St. Joseph Parish in Fort Jennings and Immaculate Conception Parish in Ottoville. The two parishes were twinned. During his time in that post, he oversaw the construction of the third church building in Fort Jennings which was dedicated in 2004.

We will continue our look at the ministry of Father Tony Borgia in our next column.

## RELATIONSHIP WITH GOD

Today's readings invite us into prayer, into relationship with God. Because relationships feel more natural when we know one another well, Sirach encourages us to know God better. In his wisdom, Sirach tells us what God is like: fair, open-minded, compassionate, and attentive. The Lord will not delay, he says. Knowing that God's help comes right on time, whenever we need it, calms our hearts and helps us trust the Lord. In his second Letter to Timothy, Saint Paul demonstrates his own trust in God. Despite the grueling struggles Saint Paul has faced because of his Christian faith, he praises the Lord for rescuing him time and again. Today's Gospel draws us close to Jesus too, revealing his special love for the poor and humble. As Jesus tells his parable about the prayer habits of a Pharisee and a tax collector, our hearts long to become as gentle as Christ's.

## TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Friday's Solemnity of All Saints and Saturday's Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed fit well at the beginning of November. The liturgical readings of this final month in the Church year are keyed to the end of time and the fulfillment of Jesus saving acts. Nowhere is this more fully celebrated than in Mexico, where November 2 is the Day of the Dead. Missionaries moved an ancient Aztec festival from midsummer to November, linking the festival to Christian themes. Today, it is a time for remembering the dead and celebrating the continuity of life, principally by festive picnics in cemeteries. There are special foods and games, and people socialize with other families and tell favorite stories about their dear ones. The sweetness of life is honored by sugary desserts and treats. Flowers, music, lights, and feasting assure that the day is not at all morbid. Traditionally, the day begins with Mass, a procession to the cemetery, and a morning feast. Most families have a special dinner with the pan de muerto, or bread of the dead. A toy skeleton is baked into the loaf, and the one who bites into it is considered lucky indeed. The dead are not feared, but deeply loved, and this joyful family feast points both to age-old customs and Resurrection faith.

## TODAY'S READINGS
